The residents are enjoying their new lifestyle, and visiting them it's quite obvious they get on well together.

"We know the staff are there, but they don't interfere — we just get on with our own lives" says Mrs Dorothy Billing, who has lived there since the unit opened in February. Mrs Min Whelan moved in at the same time. She has lived in the Box Hill area for 50 years and is pleased to be able to stay close to her family.

The Carinya unit started as an experiment but has soon shown the important role it will play in providing a range of choices in accommodation for older people.

in Darwin he has returned to Melbourne and has already taken up this new and interesting challenge at Carrum Downs.

We are very fortunate that as able and dedicated people move on to other things, there always seem to be new people coming forward to fill their places, and to make their own distinctive contributions to the total life of the Brotherhood.


