Furniture Works Training Centre

We successfully tendered to the State Government for \$90K of training funds for the calendar year 2002. (There is a limit of \$100K place first time applicants). Clearly, should we deliver this program successfully we will be able to significantly increase this in 2003.

In terms of the future thinking about the FWTC we are holding discussions with the view to developing partnerships and alliances that will create different and more sustainable models of operation for the centre. Discussions are being held with Furniture Industry Association; Furniture Industry Training Board and Holmesglen Institute of TAFE. Another strategy that can be facilitated by these groups is introduction to large manufacturers such as Moran with whom a different model of operation may be explored.

3 Presentation on Frankston Furniture Works Training Centre

Again, George Housakos, supported by Ian McHutchison, presented an outline of the current model and progress at *Frankston Furniture Works* (*FFW*) based on the paper distributed to Board members. Key points included:

- (a) The participants have been mainly younger males, with a number referred from the Juvenile Justice system.
- (b) For every training group of 15 participants, 70% have employment outcomes, and 10% have education outcomes either in advancement to Traineeships or in taking up formal education.
- (c) The retention rate in employment is about 80%.
- (d) Currently there is an emphasis on building up the production process, canvassing markets to enable more product manufacture.
- (e) Now mature-age women are coming as participants and are being placed at the same rate as males.
- (f) The Apprentice/Trainee model is now being picked up by furniture manufacturers.
- (g) A relationship has been developed with the *Furniture Industry Association* and RMIT Design students to incorporate a design component.

The Board deferred their resolutions until after the presentations and thanked George, who then left the meeting.
