JOB CENTRE UNDER WAY

Last year in 'Action' we talked about our ERIC proposal to help the un-employed. ERIC, or the Employment Resource Information Centre has now become the Job Centre and plans are well under way for its establishment.

Some legacies came to unexpectedly and hand this enabled the Board to allocate \$40,000 for the Job Centre as a one year pilot demonstration program. Bill Wells has now been appointed as the Coordinator and other staff will be employed very soon. The Centre will be located at 181 King Street, Melbourne, close to the corner of Bourke and King Streets, one block away from Spencer Street Station. It consists of a shop front which will provide an informal atmosphere where unemployed people can feel comfortable in talking through their difficulties and in finding solutions.

The main purposes of the include Job Centre practical assessing the value of an alternative, community based em-

plovment service as a to supplement the Commonwealth Employment Service. It will also provide training programs to help the unemployed in their efforts to find Centre and Brotherhood suitable work and make recommendations about improving existing services. Along with other community groups the Job Centre also aims to provide support and practical assistance to the unemployed while they are looking for work.

It is hoped to gather more detailed information on available jobs and then assist the unemployed in the job matching process. The Centre will also be encouraging participation by the unemployed in workshops and discussion groups, and will explore avenues of assistance arising as a result. Users of the Centre will be assisted to develop such skills as interview techniques, where and how to look for jobs, and appropriate ways to approach employers. The Centre will also offer advice and information on the rights of unemployed people and the assistance available the various from authorities.

The Centre will employ a full-time staff of four and

they will be supported on a part-time basis by the Brotherhood's Social Policy Officer, and Research Officer who will also evaluate those areas of the Project which are largely experimental.
