Dear Minister,

Re: Closure of Family Planning Clinics

The Brotherhood of St Laurence has a particular interest in family planning services having established a pilot family planning clinic for low income families in 1967 and having recommended on the basis of this that in 1970 the State Government accept responsibility for the provision of family planning services for low income groups.

We are extremely concerned that the closure of clinics and reliance on general practitioners will exclude vulnerable women from assistance and advice on birth control, sexually transmitted diseases and cervical and breast cancer checks. For instance, many young women feel more confident about seeking advice from a family planning clinic than their family GP. And many women from non-English speaking backgrounds appreciate the ready access to female doctors which family planning clinics provide.

Whilst we appreciate the difficult budgetary position of the Victorian Government, we urge you to rethink this decision and continue to fund the clinics. Their vital contribution to women's health and the prevention of poverty through unplanned pregnancies were the reasons the Brotherhood pioneered these services.
